Those conditions and diseases that occur soon after delivery will be the subject of Chapter 3.

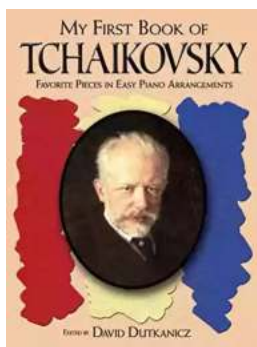
It is in Chapter 4 that we'll look at the diseases and conditions that can occur many years following pregnancy and delivery.
