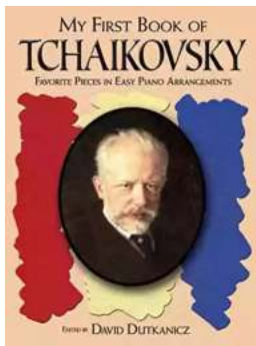
This book gives our experience in visiting Cambodia few years back. Our visit to places of interest in Phnom Penh viz. King's palace, National Museum, Buddha
